## Addressing the Needs of Your LGBQT+ Patients 1:00 p.m. - 2:00 p.m.

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The lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender, and queer (LGBTQ) population encounters unique challenges associated with their healthcare, which is accompanied by lesser outcomes when compared to that of their heterosexual equals. There are several contributing factors including inadequate access to healthcare, lack of insurance, an absence of culturally competent medical professionals that are trained in LGBTQ health issues, and the limitations of some electronic health record systems to properly identify gender, which are just a few of the contributing factors to malpractice claims. This presentation will highlight LGBTQ healthcare disparities and emphasize the importance creating and affirming an inclusive environment for this population while treating each person as a unique individual.

- identify the inequalities associated with the care of LGBTQ patients,
- discuss recent legislation affecting LGBTQ healthcare,
- utilize strategies to communicate effectively with the LGBTQ patient, and
- implement measures to mitigate the liability risks associated with treating this patient population.

# Effective Use and Supervision of Advance Practice Providers 2:00 p.m. - 3:00 p.m.

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With the demand for healthcare outpacing the number of available physicians, coupled with the aging of the American population, patient care is increasingly provided by Advanced Practice Providers (APPs) in a wide variety of healthcare settings. Research suggests that that Advanced Practice Registered Nurse and Physician Assistant jobs will grow exponentially over the next decade.

This growth in the use of APPs has led to an increase in medical malpractice litigation. Allegations arise from direct patient care by APPs, as well as from the supervision of these providers by physicians and healthcare organizations. This presentation will address the scope of practice and liability risks associated with supervising advanced practice providers, and offer best practices to reduce the potential of claims associated with their care.
