

MEDICAL SOCIETY OF THE STATE OF NEW YORK (MSSNY) FY2024-25 BUDGET PRIORITIES

MSSNY Supports Range of Health Care Initiatives in Governor Hochul's Proposed Budget; Voices Concern Over Host of Other Potential Changes

Governor Hochul's proposed Budget for FY 2024-25 lays out a roadmap for how New York state will spend approximately \$233 billion in the next year and introduces a number of comprehensive initiatives to help support New York's health care system. The Budget also makes significant investments to guarantee more patients have comprehensive health insurance coverage to access the quality medical care they need and deserved. The following highlights MSSNY's position on a range of these funding proposals.

MSSNY SUPPORTS

- \$74 million for enhanced payments in Patient Centered Medical Home program.
- Increased Medicaid rates for care to those with intellectual, physical or mental disabilities.
- \$55 million to establish 200 new inpatient psychiatric beds.
- Reducing Interest Rate on court judgments from 9% to prevailing market rate.
- \$315 million to provide Enhanced subsidies for purchase of commercial health insurance coverage in NYS Exchange (up to 350% of FPL).
- Continuing Telehealth insurance coverage payment parity for an additional year.
- Permitting Medical Assistants to provide immunizations.
- Additional loan repayment programs for psychiatrists and primary care physicians who make a 4year commitment to devote a substantial portion of their practice to treating patients insured by Medicaid.





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MSSNY OPPOSES

- Repealing authorization for the MSSNY's Committee for Physicians Health (CPH) program. This proposal comes only one year after the Administration proposed continuing the program for 10 years and a final agreement to preserve it until 2028.
- Requiring physicians to pay 50% of the Excess Medical Malpractice coverage cost- proposal that
 previous, recent Legislatures have rejected a nearly \$40 million hit to community physicians across the
 state.
- Permitting Physicians Assistants (PAs) to practice without any physician supervision or collaboration after 8,000 clinical hours if they practice in primary care or are employed by a hospital.
- Permitting dentists to provide certain COVID, flu and HPV vaccinations, and authorizes them to perform screening tests for HIV, Hepatitis and Diabetes.
- Extend authority of Nurse Practitioners to practice without physician collaboration for another two years.
- Increased prior authorization hassles for Medicaid prescriptions by repealing "prescriber prevails" protections.
- Authorizing pharmacists to test and dispense for PreP pursuant to non-patient specific order.
- Removing opportunity to bring Medicaid Managed Care claims to independent dispute resolution (IDR).
