



## **Governor Advances Executive Budget: MSSNY Urges that State Budget Not Be Balanced on the Backs of New York's Dedicated Physicians**

The Governor released her proposed \$260 Billion Executive Budget for the 2026-27 fiscal year this week. Many of the proposals advanced are similar to past years, but in some cases, there are additional nuances that make them even more problematic. While there are some positive initiatives such as prior authorization reform and telehealth payment parity, the combined weight of adverse proposals noted below will – if enacted - make it close to impossible for New York's relatively few remaining community-based medical practices to remain afloat, exacerbating patient access to care challenges.

The significant number of adverse Budget proposals is a critical reason for physicians to PLAN TO BE IN ALBANY ON MARCH 10 to ask for fairness at MSSNY's Annual [Physician Advocacy Day](#).

### **Adverse Proposals**

- Require the 16,000 physicians Excess Medical Malpractice Insurance coverage to pay 50% costs, a cumulative \$40 million hit on New York's physician community. Send a letter in opposition here: [Urge Legislature to Reject Physician Cost-Share for Excess Program](#).
- Upend New York's innovative IDR payment resolution process for non-participating provider claims by altering the criteria to make it one-sided towards health insurer interests and eliminate ability to appeal out of network Medicaid Managed Care disputes to IDR. - Permit many PAs to practice without any defined physician supervision after 8,000 hours practice, despite a law enacted last year giving PAs significantly more care responsibilities. Send a letter in opposition here: [Preserve Physician-led, Team-based Healthcare](#)
- Eliminate the role of the county medical society in approving physicians to participate in the Workers' Compensation program. Send a letter in opposition here: [Workers Compensation](#)
- Expand the reporting requirements for completed material healthcare acquisitions, including those completed dating back to 2023.
- Passing from SED to DOH oversight of physician private practice incorporation.

- Giving auto insurers a much longer timeframe to challenge No-Fault medical claims.

### **Positive Provisions**

- Proposing a series of prior authorization reforms, including prohibiting health plans from requiring Prior Authorization for the treatment of chronic conditions more than once per year, and requiring greater transparency of Prior Auth denials.
- Permitting Medical Assistants to administer immunizations.
- Extending telehealth health insurance payment parity for 2 more years.
- Linking immunization coverage standards to those recommended by AAP, AAFP, ACP or ACOG.
- Expanding and clarifying coverage for Biomarker testing.
- Additional funding for the Medical Indemnity Fund.
- Reducing Interest rates on court judgments from 9% to a market rate.
- Increased investment in the Early Intervention program.
- CPH funded at historical level of \$990,000.
- Doctors Across New York medical student loan relief program funded at historical level of \$15.86M.

MSSNY's Governmental Affairs staff is continuing to pore through the thousands of pages of Budget bills for additional items of interest and/or additional nuances to these proposals.

### **Legislature Passes Chapter Amendment to New Law Requiring Greater Transparency and Consent for Use of Virtual Credit Cards (VCCs)**

In response to complaints of health plans unilaterally attempting to make payment for patient care services using VCCs that impose steep fees on physicians for their use, in December Governor Hochul signed into law legislation ([A3986-A/S2105-A](#)) to facilitate greater transparency and require express consent to permit a health plan or insurer to make payment through use of a VCC.

The new law requires that a health plan seeking to pay a physician or other health care provider using a VCC or other form of electronic funds transfer that imposes a fee or similar charge to process the payment must first (1) notify the physician or provider of the potential fees or charge, (2) offer the physician or provider an alternative payment method that does not impose such fees or charge, and (3) permit the physician or provider to elect to accept such payment types. Moreover, it enables the physician or other provider to change the designated payment type by notifying the health plan or insurer in writing.

The legislation was signed by the Governor with the understanding the State Legislature would enact a chapter amendment in early 2026. The agreed-upon chapter amendments set forth that the payment method election must be acted on by the physician or other care provider within 30 days of receipt of notice from the insurer. If the physician or provider does not respond within 30 days, the insurer must pay the physician or other provider using a fee-free method of payment. That legislation [A9510](#) passed the Assembly this week, and will likely pass the Senate next week. It applies to contracts entered, altered, or modified on or after June 17, 2026.

**US House of Representatives Holds Hearing on Abusive Practices by Health Insurers**

The US House Energy & Commerce Health Subcommittee and Ways & Means Committee held hearings on Capitol Hill on Thursday, January 22<sup>nd</sup>, with explosive examples given of heartbreaking coverage denials, surprising executive compensation and vaccine coverage, among other insurer practices harming patients by major health insurers including UnitedHealth, Cigna, Elevance Health, and others.

One member of the committee dubbed UnitedHealth Group the "poster child for Medicare Advantage abuse" and said the plan's practice of delaying or denying claims "looks like a business model" to increase profits. Another member told the story of a constituent who had a UnitedHealth Medicare Advantage Plan and was hospitalized after suffering a stroke. UnitedHealth refused to pay for their hospitalization saying that it was "medically unnecessary," overriding their physician's medical decision and leaving the patient stuck with a huge bill. The story of a California family who had to declare bankruptcy after UnitedHealth refused to pay for treatment for their daughter's bladder tumor.

While no policy changes were offered, the Affordable Care Act (ACA) was mentioned at several points with Republicans arguing it had increased healthcare costs, while Democrats praised it for reducing the number of uninsured patients and urged the Senate to extend the ACA's expanded premium tax credits, a measure that recently passed the House of Representatives.

The timing for this event is critical because it is around the same time that both the Assembly and Senate are finalizing their respective one-House Budgets setting the stage for negotiations with the Governor.

This year, we will be actively advocating on a range of critical issues that directly impact patient care and the practice of medicine. Key priorities include advancing Prior Authorization Reform to reduce administrative delays and ensure timely access to care, protecting physicians' right to a fair and independent dispute resolution (IDR) process, defeating proposals that would shift excess medical malpractice insurance costs onto physicians, preserving physician-led, team-based healthcare, and preserving the role of county medical societies in the Workers' Compensation application process.
